2021 Quilt Extravaganza! A WHS Fundraising Event Harris-Kearney House September 4 - October 30, 2021

Exhibit and tour hours are Friday and Saturday, 1-5 pm.

The Westport Historical Society and the 1855 Harris-Kearney House Museum are pleased to announce a special QUILT EXHIBIT in September and October with beautiful Harris-Kearney House quilts from the 19th century. **Our featured exhibitor is Mrs. Tammy Reid**, whose husband is Andy Reid, the head coach of the Kansas City Chiefs.



Quilting is an art form and one we are pleased to share. Tammy has graciously allowed the museum to display quilts from her private collection. She has been collecting quilts from across the country for many years and will share 65 of over 150 collected quilts which contain vibrant colors, historic patterns, and one-of-a-kind designs. We are grateful to Tammy for sharing her love of unique and dazzling quilts with our members and friends.

Our goal is to educate and stir-up excitement about quilts from 1830 to today. The quilts show the evolution of quilt construction, what materials were used, meaning of the symbols in the patterns, stories they tell, and the purposes for which they were made. The exhibit will also show how the art of quilt making has evolved—many of the same patterns, just a modern way of putting it all together. The cost is \$10 per person. Private and group tours may also be booked on Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday from 1-5 pm. Aunt Minerva's Kitchen

Baked Lima Beans

One of our favorite recipes from Old Westport. Try it with your September, harvested Lima Beans. The grandchildren ask for seconds and thirds!

½ lb. lima beans	3-4 slices of raw bacon, chopped
2 T. chopped onion	2-3 T. brown sugar
2 T. chopped green pepper	Salt
Water—enough to boil beans	Bacon drippings

Cook beans in water until they are almost done. Pour beans and remaining liquid into casserole. Add onion, green pepper, brown sugar, salt, and bacon drippings for seasoning. Put chopped raw bacon pieces over the top. Bake for about 2 hours or until tender.



ANTIQUe SPOTLIGHT: Our Camel Back Trunk

Trunks date back to at least medieval times, but truly gained popularity during the Victorian Era. In the beginning, trunks were little more than a lockable, wooden box with a simple, or decorative paper-lined interior. Over time, trunks were covered in leather, canvas, tasteful paper, embossed tin, and metal hardware. Most of the new trunks had different compartments, drawers, and trays to hold a variety of shapes and sizes of personal items.

One special trunk was known by several names: camel back, round top, barrel, dome top and humpback. This design was first made in the early 1800's in Europe with an important idea in mind: the tops of the trunks were curved in both directions making it impossible for other luggage to be stacked on top of them while the owners were traveling. The design meant these trunks were the last ones on a boat or train, and the first ones to be removed! Stop by the Mansion House to view our camel back trunk which dates to the 1860's.

SEPTEMBER HOLIDAYS

Labor Day: Monday, September 6

Labor Day pays tribute to the contributions and achievements of American workers and is observed on the first Monday in September.

It was created by the labor movement in the late 19th century and became a federal holiday in 1894.

Native American Day: Friday, September 24

Native American Day is observed on the second Monday in October and celebrates the cultures and contributions of Native American tribes. While it is not celebrated in all 50 states, it is recognized in both California and South Dakota and is gaining popularity in the rest of the nation.



UNCLE MARKS CORNER Crops to Harvest in September



It is September and time to harvest autumn strawberries, raspberries, blackberries, grapes, apples, plums, pears, figs, and peaches. Remember that vegetable crops will begin to take longer to ripen in September, so give melons, lima beans, and tomatoes more time to ripen naturally. Eggplants are ready to harvest when they are shiny and gather the onions after the leaves turn yellow and the stems bend over.

Beans, cucumbers, melons, zucchini, and summer squash will not ripen once they are picked, but they will last in the refrigerator for a week or two.

Dig white and sweet potatoes just before the first frost of the season. Also, before the first frost, pick all tomatoes, peppers, beans, vine crops, winter squashes and other tender vegetables. Other crops to harvest in September are beets, radishes, lettuce, spinach, endive, and kale. Most of these fruits and vegetables can be canned for use during the winter months.

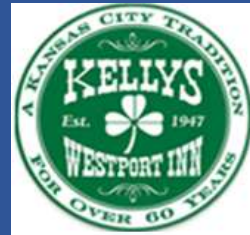
